Harmful Foods

We eat many foods that are harmful to animals. Some human foods can cause kidney failure, anemia, diarrhea, vomiting, lethargy, and can be fatal. The following foods should not be fed to your animal:

- Avocados
- Chocolate (all forms)
- Coffee (all forms)
- Onions & Onion Powder
- Garlic
- Grapes
- Raisins
- Macadamia Nuts
- Alcoholic Beverages
- Moldy/Spoiled Foods
- Salt
- Fatty Foods
- Gum & Candies
- Tea Leaves
- Raw Yeast Dough

Pre-Anesthetic Blood Testing

The vast majority of veterinarians recommend pre-anesthetic blood testing to help identify patients at risk of complications due to general anesthesia. The anesthetics that are used are processed by the liver and kidneys. It is important to know how these organs are functioning before giving a general anesthetic. The blood tests that are performed are a blood chemistry panel and a complete blood count (CBC.) The CBC is a common test that measures the number of red blood cells, white blood cells, and platelets. This test helps to diagnose anemia, hydration, and infection. The blood chemistry panel measures many of the organ systems of the body to make sure the body is functioning properly. Dr. Thunell recommends any animal that will be administered general anesthesia, even young and seemingly healthy animals, have pre-anesthetic blood tests performed prior to sedation.
