Microchipping

State law requires that all dogs and cats must have a permanent means of identification. There are two ways of doing this: a tag attached to the pet's collar bearing the owner's name, address, and telephone number, or a permanent microchip under the skin. Unlike the microchip, the tag can fall off or the entire collar with the tag can get lost. The microchip is the size of a grain of rice and is implanted under the pet's skin with a syringe. If the pet ever gets lost they can be scanned (veterinary hospitals, humane societies, and shelters have microchip scanners), it will give the microchip number, then the veterinary team member can call the 24 hour hotline where they can get the information that was provided at enrollment and your pet will then be returned to you. Microchipping can be done at any time. It is recommended all dogs and cats be microchipped. Please call any time to schedule an appointment to have your pet microchipped.

Lyme Disease

Lyme disease is spread by ticks. The number of cases of lyme disease has tripled since 1990. Lyme disease can be found in all of the United States. The disease is mainly seen in dogs and symptoms include lethargy, loss of appetite, lameness, kidney damage or failure, and heart disorders. Symptoms may not always be present, making diagnosing difficult. Lyme disease can be prevented by having your pet vaccinated once a year. This vaccine is highly recommended if you live in a heavily wooded area or if you take you're pet camping or hiking. Please call us if you have any questions regarding your pet and lyme disease.

Featured Product

Our featured product of the month is Comfortis. Comfortis is a fast acting flea preventative for dogs. Comfortis is given orally and is a chewable beef flavored treat. Comfortis begins working in as little as thirty minutes and will continue working for four weeks. Comfortis is to be given once a month all year round. It will eliminate fleas on your dog and prevent future infestations of fleas.
